THEO 143-01: RELIGIONS OF THE WORLD

Online (Asynchronous), Summer 2024

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1. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Where is faith found on the earth? Today, we have faith experiences in religious institutions and in surprising contexts! The more we learn about our own traditions, the more we see how important it is to see the existence and validity of different traditions!

THEO-143-01 is a survey of world religions that makes undergraduate students conversational about a variety of global religious characteristics. We will use readings, pre-recorded lessons, and films to promote interest and highlight religious themes. This class teaches valuable habits which help you understand different religious viewpoints and relate to people whose worldviews are radically different from your own. These habits can help to open up new and excellent partnerships which help religious and non-religious people face pressing issues together.

2. COURSE PROCESS

How does my religious/non-religious viewpoint engage with differing viewpoints? This is the question that we will think, read, watch, and talk out in this course! Each week offers a three-part interactive class session.

- 1) Watching the recorded presentation of the week's main topic in Canvas.
- 2) Reading the assigned chapters from the course text.
- 3) Completing **ONE** "Path" that reinforces the content of the recording and the reading.

You will also complete a Midterm and Final Exam to show what you learned in the course.

3. COURSE GOALS

This course will hone your abilities, skills, knowledge, and attitudes related to world religions:

Ability: Understand one's own view of God, humanity, and the universe.


Skill: Talk about one's own perspective in a way that is informed by people of other faiths.

Knowledge: Learn to identify the sacred texts, founders, and prayer practices of major world religions.

Attitude: Develop a friendly appreciation of the commonalities and distinctions of world religions.
