

COURSE INTRO

1. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Where is faith found on the earth? Today, we have faith experiences in religious institutions and in surprising contexts! The more we learn about our own traditions, the more we see how important it is to see the existence and validity of other religious traditions!

Thus, this course is an undergraduate survey of world religions. THEO-143-01 makes undergraduate students conversational about a variety of global religious characteristics. We will use readings, pre-recorded lessons, and films to promote interest and highlight religious themes.

This class teaches valuable habits which help you understand different religious viewpoints and relate to people whose worldviews are radically different from your own. These habits can help to open up new and excellent partnerships which help religious and non-religious people face pressing issues together.

2. COURSE PROCESS

How does my religious/non-religious viewpoint engage with differing viewpoints? This is the question that we will think, read, watch, play, and talk out in this course! Each week offers a four-part interactive class session.

- Watching the recorded presentation of the week's main topic in Canvas.
- Reading the assigned chapters from the course text.
- Writing a "Door Opener" response to the Reading Material.
- Completing ONE "Path" that reinforces the content of the recording and the reading.

3. COURSE GOALS

This course will hone your abilities, skills, knowledge, and attitudes related to world religions:

Ability: Understand one's own view of God, humanity, and the universe.

Skill: Talk about one's own perspective in a way that is informed by people of other faiths.


Knowledge: Learn to identify the sacred texts, founders, and prayer practices of major world religions.

Attitude: Develop a friendly appreciation of the commonalities and distinctions of world religions.

In addition to these Instructional Objectives (IO), this course will help students grow in their abilities to:

- → Think in systematic and integrative ways about the vocabulary and concepts of world religions and global/cultural perspectives
- Use theological resources to connect with one's personal beliefs/ viewpoints and engage new ideas, and

6. COURSE ACTIVITIES

All students start at zero and build points toward their grade, rather than start with a perfect score and lose points for mistakes. This approach emphasizes the paths to successful learning, rather than emphasizing the mistakes.

Here is the list of the activities that you can do to earn points towards your final grade, followed by the grading scale. Please note that the point totals shown for each activity are the maximum points possible; you don't automatically get all the points just for turning something in or "giving a good effort;" you have to do well to earn the maximum points!

6.1 DOOR OPENERS

Each "Path" is a way to earn points. Paths best begin with the "Door Opener," which rewards you for reflecting on the Recorded Lesson and deciding how to engage the Course Content for the week. Notably, these Door Opener points are the way that your overall Point Total is "rounded up" at the end of the course.

Each Recorded Lesson poses a question called the "Door Opener" (DO). Each week, you can write a brief response (at least 2 sentences) to the DO. This shows that you watched the lesson, this earns 1 point, and this "opens the door" to complete a weekly activity.

6.2 PATHS - Point Activities to Help Students

Crucial Explanations About Taking Your One Path: Please do not try to take all the Paths each week. Please choose one, and only one, Path each week. If you take more than one Path in one week, only the first completed Path earns points – all others will earn 0 points. .

You can take one different Path each week. For example, you can do Quiz-Taking one week, Video-Vocabbing another week, Film-Versation the next week, World-Scripturing after that, and Outthinking the AI later on. Or, you can take the same Path each week. For example, you can do Quiz-Taking each week (NOTE: Quiz-Taking each week does not lead to an A).

Basically, taking the one Path earns points, while not taking one Path forfeits points. Please try not to continually choose to not take one Path each week. This is the most important thing you will read in the Syllabus: The surest avenue to success is consistently striving to earn the most points possible on the Paths (particularly, taking Path 5) each week, as healthily and realistically as you can.

Brief descriptions of each Path are listed below (See Canvas for more information. Remember, please choose only one Path each week).

PATH 1: QUIZ-TAKING (up to 10 points): Take open book guizzes to show what you learned from the Recorded Lessons and Reading Material.

PATH 2: VIDEO-VOCABBING (up to 15 points): Record your own audio-and-visual explanation of the key vocabulary words for the current week's readings, in your own words. PATH 3: FILM-VERSATION (up to 15 points): Watch the week's movie (see 8. Course Schedule). Record a 2-3 minute audio-visual that explains how one character from the movie changed your understanding of the people in that week's religion, and how certain scenes depict the religion's problem, solution, techniques, and exemplars.

PATH 4: WORLD-SCRIPTURING (up to 15 points): Read the week's one or two chapters in the World Scriptures (see 8. Course Schedule) which address several topics. Focus on ONE of those topics. Then, record your own 2-3 minute audio-and-visual that 1)lists the religion of the week's problem, solution, techniques, and exemplars, 2) talks about how these connect to the topic from the World Scripture you selected, and 3) talk about how two scriptures listed under the topic illustrate one element of the religion of the week's (problem, solution, technique, or exemplars).

PATH 5: OUTTHINKING THE AI (up to 18 points): Read an AI-generated answer to a prompt related to the key concept for the current week. Record your own audio-and-visual response to this AI content.

PLEASE NOTE:

- Please make Recorded Paths longer than 1 minute and shorter than 5 minutes.
- There is a "Path Templates" Module on Canvas to help make your Paths.
- There is a "Path Recording Checklist and Guides" Module to help you record your Paths.

SCORING EXPLANATION:

Turning in Paths 2-4 on Canvas/On Time = 10 Standard Points (13 points for Path 5)

- +1 TIME for staying within 2-3 minutes
- +1 READING for displaying 3 or more strong and accurate quotations of Reading Material and Class Content, with citations (example: "Cite your sources" (Jones, 7).
- +1 HUMANITY for appearing on-screen
- +1 CREATIVITY for recording your audio-visual answer as a presentation (PowerPoint, Keynote, Canva, etc.) with multiple slides containing pictures/graphics, movie clips, music, etc. +1 CURIOSITY - talking about what interests you and why, or what confuses you and how you
- helped yourself to understand the concept.

= TOTAL POINTS

MIDTERM & FINAL EXAM: There is also a Week 6 Midterm and a Week 12 Final (see Canvas for details). There are no make-ups except for the following reasons: important college sports events (with supporting official request from the athlete's college supervisor), very serious health conditions (with official report from a doctor) or death in student's family. It is the student's responsibility to communicate any of these reasons to the professor before the due date of the exam.

REDEMPTION PATH!

If you mess up on one Path, fully complete the Redemption Path by the end of the semester. This will replace the lowest score you earned on a previous Path with 18 points. The guide to completing the Redemption Path is available on Canvas, in the "Redemption Path" Module.

8. COURSE POLICIES

Please pursue befitting professional behaviors. Avoid behaviors unbefitting for the college environment.

"Blank" File Policy: If a student turns in a blank file, a corrupted file where the audio or video freezes in places, a video that has no audio, a video that is an audio-only blank screen, the wrong file in the wrong place, an "unreadable file type," a Google Drive link (especially one that does not provide immediate access to the file) or does not succeed in successfully uploading a difficult or slow-to-load file on Canvas or an email that was scheduled to send but did not actually get delivered, and the right file isn't turned in before the due time, the student earns a "0" as a result.

Cheating and Plagiarism Policy: Students are required to adhere to the Duquesne University Academic Integrity Policy, as explained here. 

Over the span of several years, I have designed this course process to ensure that you will have content (which you built for yourselves) from this class to carry with you, beyond this semester, across college, and over the diverse terrains of your lives.

10. I HAVE CONFIDENCE IN YOUR ABILITIES!

Overall, this course is a launchpad for your unfolding knowledge about the global religions. You will also cultivate the habits that you will adopt in the post-college phase of your life – earning and keeping track of the "points" (money) that you earn, refining your abilities to undertake some projects while avoiding others, discerning what you can and cannot realistically accomplish due to time constraints, and finding ways to accomplish tasks despite unfamiliar instructions or an overwhelming amount of information. These are skills that benefit students in any discipline!

Generally, being a student is about showing up, participation, effort, and distinguishing oneself in excellence. Many will show up for class, which is always the first half of the journey of learning! Most will participate by engaging the course material and assignments. A good amount of students will put forth a valiant effort by doing everything realistically and healthily possible to earn points toward a desired grade. The key is to understand that showing up, participation, and effort comprise the path toward earning the grade you desire, but not the <u>guarantee</u>. "A" students are the particular few who are willing and able to distinguish themselves by putting their personalized stamp of excellence (not perfection) on quizzes, reflections, presentations, etc. To be sure, everyone does not arrive at excellence at the same time, because everyone holds diverse strengths and weaknesses – and this is okay! As you progress through this course, please advance with this assurance – I have confidence in your abilities!
